Funds Sought To Bring Boy Home

Richard Leslie's life was not a complicated one just before Christmas. He was as happy as a young, single, 22-year-old usually is. He had a job in which he had gradually progressed. He had friends.

He enjoyed his life in Columbia, S.C., and he no doubt looked forward to the Christmas season when he could return home to visit his family in Kernersville--his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Leslie and three younger brothers.

But Richard's life and the lives of his family suddenly became more complicated on December 11. Richard suffered extensive head injuries when the car in which he was riding crashed into a tree.

Richard didn't get home for Christmas.

He has been in a Columbia hospital since Dec. 11, and his family is still waiting to bring him home. But there's a problem--money and the bureaucratic tangle of insurance.

Richard's medical bills are huge and he had no insurance. So far the hospital bill alone tops \$91,000, and the figure will grow because Richard is far from recovered. He still needs constant care, and his family is convinced that he needs that care close to home--at Whitaker Care Center--a branch of Forsyth Memorial Hospital.

To be admitted to Whitaker Care, however, the family will have to pay a deposit--\$12,000.

But perhaps with the help of some caring neighbors and fellow members of Richard's church, Holy Cross Catholic Church, that \$12,000 and more may be raised.

Bill Conner, a member of Holy Cross, and Beverly Armstrong, also a member of Holy Cross and a friend of Richard's mother, have taken on a campaign to raise money to bring Richard home. A special account has been set up at a local bank and brainstorming sessions have been held to figure out fund-raising methods to help defray the expenses of Richard's illness.

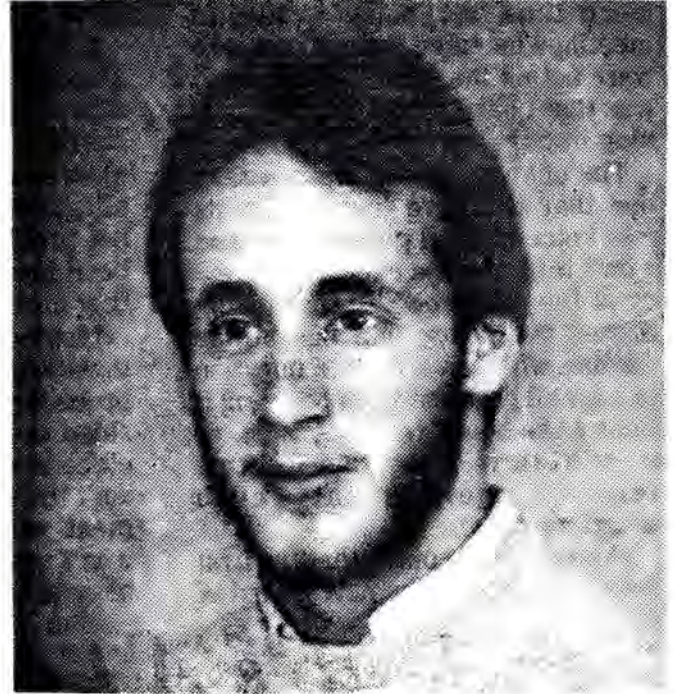
But the first step is to raise the \$12,000 needed to bring the boy home to Forsyth County.

Since the accident, Richard's mother, Susan Leslie, has been on leave of absence from her job at Varco-Pruden so that she can care for her son. She travels to the hospital in Columbia several times a week to check on his progress, to feed him, offer him encouragement and handle the mountains of paper-work.

Her husband Robert Leslie, travels extensively for Ciba-Geigy and has also been to Columbia frequently to care for the boy. The other family members-- sons, Mark, 17, Jeff, 18, and Robert Jr., 20, have tried to keep things running smoothly at home.

It's been hard.

Richard is conscious, his mother says. He seems to recognize some people and sometimes he will squeeze your hand when asked to, but he is unable to move his arms and legs. He has undergone several surgeries to correct the



build-up of pressure in his skull and doctors are hopeful that the latest surgery will improve his condition. Now physical therapy and time are needed to further his recovery.

"Our first priority is to try to get Richard home," said Sue Leslie last week. The strain of the last two months shows in her eyes, but not in her determination to help her son.

"We have always heard good things about Whitaker Care and we are sure we'll see some improvement in Richard if we can get him there where he'll be stimulated, where the nurses will demand more from him and where he can be challenged to get better."

Mrs. Leslie said that she has filed for Medicaid for her son, and that may pay for part of his expenses, but the money is only promised for later, and she feels that Richard needs to be home now.

Bill Conner and Beverly Armstrong took on the task of raising money because, as they said, "This could have been our son--it could have been anybody's son."

"I had heard of the boy's problem, Conner said last week, "and I just decided one day that, well, I'd been given a lot in this life and it was time for me to give some back. That's when I decided to begin a campaign to raise money for Richard and to get the whole community behind it."

Conner recruited Mrs. Armstrong, a friend of Mrs. Leslie's, to help in the campaign, and in the next few weeks, she hopes to organize a number of other community groups to participate in the fund-raising activities.

"Anyone who is interested in helping us, or contributing can call either me or Bill Conner, or contact The Kernersville News. We'd like to get the whole community involved in this because Sue and Bob need our help to bring Richard home again."

Tootsie Roll Magic

RURAL HALL — For the 29 severely retarded children who live at Horizons Residential Care Center here, Tootsie Rolls are magic wands and the Knights of Columbus wear shining armor.

If the children could tell you why that is so, they would. But it takes no extraordinary powers of observation to see for yourself.

During a brief visit Friday, the reasons were everywhere.

In a therapy room, a handsome little boy alternately grinned and yawned as he lay on his side, strapped to a device called a Sideliner. Minutes before, he had been fidgety. His bones and muscles had been stiffening into a kind of rigidity that brings pain and restlessness.

Now he was comfortable and happy, about to sleep.

Nearby, a bigger boy was strapped into a tilt table, beginning the process of learning to stand by himself and coordinate his arm, hand and upper-body movements. While he learned those things, the exercise would strengthen his bones and muscles and improve such body functions as urinary drainage and bowel movement.

"He can't stand alone, or walk," said Frankie Caudle, who works with the children in the room. "This is to help him build up his leg muscles and be able to stand — someday — alone."

"We put his toys there (on the table). He plays a little piano."

If it sounds small, it isn't. Someday the boy may be able to walk alone and to use his arms and hands while he uses his legs. Those are joyful triumphs for a severely retarded, physically disabled child.

The money for the Sideliner and the tilt table came from Operation LAMB (for "least among my brethren"), in which members of the Knights of Columbus give away Tootsie Rolls and accept donations. All the proceeds go to improve the lives of retarded children and adults.

For Horizons, one of five local centers and agencies that benefit, the money — a very small portion of the annual budget — has made a big difference. "They've been very, very helpful to us," said Tom Byrd, executive director of Horizons. "They've been one of the biggest friends to the retarded in the community for years... They've just been tremendously responsive."

Byrd ticked off some of the contributions made by the Knights: a new roof on the large building that now houses offices, freeing up living and learning space in other buildings; a paved walkway from one cottage to another, eliminating a long, rough detour; equipment including specially equipped wheelchairs, a graphic laminator to protect teaching materials and even a commercial kitchen stove to improve the food and reduce the unbearable heat that the old stove created.



OCTOBER S.S.C. MEETING

A small group of Holy Cross Knights rendezvous'd at the Barney Fife Memorial Cafe in Walkertown at 6 am on Saturday October 19. At a breakfast conference the group named itself the "Squirrel Conservation Corps" (SSC) and proceeded to Bob Lipstreu's squirrel ranch for a day in the field. After four hours of extensive search yielding but one specimen, they reassembled, declared the squirrel an endangered species, and vowed to continue efforts to prevent extinction. Final score: Knights 6, Squirrels 1. (the Squirrels won)

The above was not the way the squirrel hunt was planned, but that's how it turned out. Anyway, a good time was had by all.

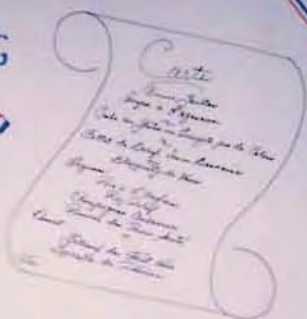

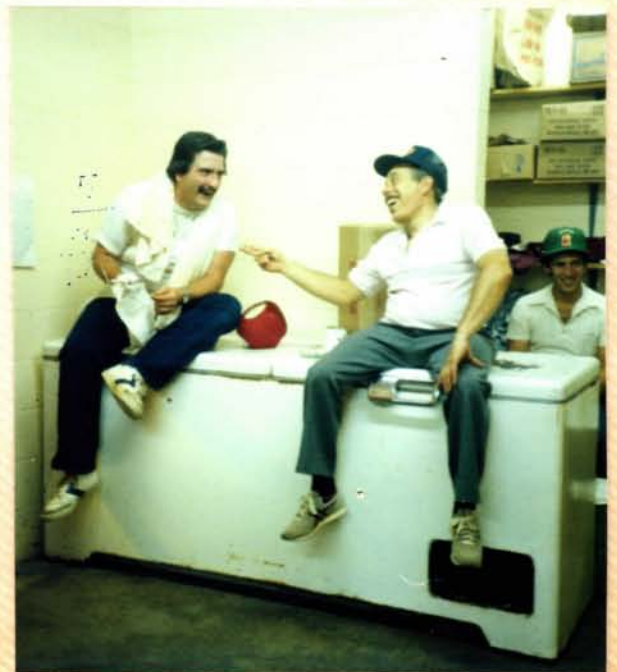
ALTAR BOYS

TEEN CHALLENGE



SEPTEMBER SOCIAL MEETING

The girls from Teen Challenge of Harmony, NC (all 23 strong plus staff) visited us on September 25 and gave an inspiring presentation on their struggle with alcohol, drugs, and mental problems, and how they overcame them through Jesus. Thanks to R.V. Wakefield for another job well done.

PURPOSE

- The First Teen Challenge was started by Reverend David Wilkerson in New York City in 1959. David Wilkerson is known worldwide for his evangelism among teenage street gangs. He is the author of "Cross and the Switchblade", the book responsible for the stirring movie by the same title.
- After ministering the love of God through Jesus Christ to teenagers many of them accepted God's way out of their problems — by making Jesus Christ their Saviour and Lord. These new Christians experienced difficulty living their new life in their old environment. God worked through David to provide a new home for them to learn and grow. This new home was called Teen Challenge.

ADMISSION

- Girls and women are referred to the home by pastors, friends, relatives, courts, probation officers and social workers. These individuals come from all over the country.
- The program is totally voluntary and free of charge.

FACTS-AT-A-GLANCE

- Teen Challenge of North Carolina is a rehabilitation home for girls and women who have been involved in drug addiction, alcoholism, delinquency and other serious problems.
- The home, located in Harmony, N.C., started July 2, 1979.
- The home is for girls and women, 14 years of age and older.
- The home is capable of handling a maximum of 17 at a time.
- Teen Challenge of North Carolina is a non-profit corporation licensed by the State of North Carolina as a drug rehabilitation center.
- Teen Challenge is staffed by two directors, six counselors and is governed by a board of directors.
- There are over 88 Teen Challenge Centers in the United States, Puerto Rico, Europe, the Middle East, India, South Africa, Malaysia and Brazil.
- Each Teen Challenge center is self-supporting.

RESULTS

- A government survey conducted in 1975 by the National Opinion Research Center of the University of Chicago, showed that eighty-six percent of the students who graduated from the Teen Challenge program were still drug-free seven years later.*

A TYPICAL DAY



The morning hours are spent in the classroom. Classes include Bible studies, reading of the New Testament, memorizing scriptures and reading and studying required books. Emphasis is placed on each individual giving the word of God central place in her life.

The afternoon work program

CLASSES

is an important and vital part in the home. The jobs include cleaning, cooking, office work and yard and maintenance care. The lessons learned in the morning are given a chance to be practiced.

The evening hours are spent in study, class preparation, relaxation and worship and prayer.

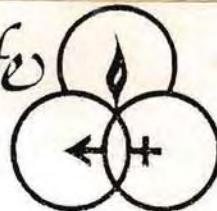
roll. A request for a donation to assist the local retarded population is their intent.

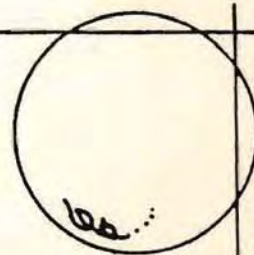

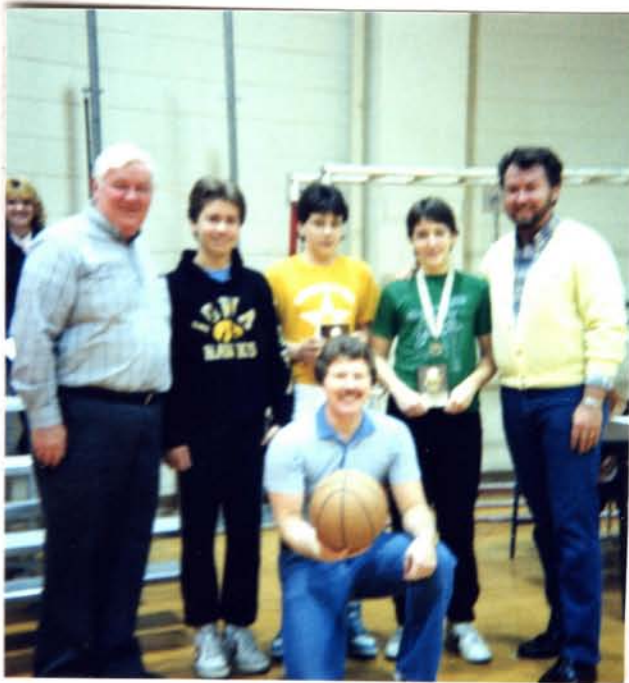
